

<u>Brown Bag</u>: Karl Farwig gave a presentation on using the Hands On Connect (HOC) computer system and how to enter Master Gardener volunteer and education hours.

The formal meeting began at 7:03 PM.

<u>Appointment of Vice President</u>: Marilynn Beltz has been appointed to fill out the remaining term of the Vice President position vacated when Lisa McClain became President.

## Minutes of the Previous Meeting:

Elaine Reynolds gave a review of the minutes from 11/10/2022. A motion to approve the minutes was made by Lynn Farwig and seconded by Judi Clymer. The motion passed.

**Treasurer's Report:** Lisa McClain for Ann Woolum, and Karl Farwig

Unrestricted cash \$6778.59 Community Garden \$489.07 Total Cash \$7267.66

- Income during December was \$967.60, and expenses were \$377.37. There was also a donation from Lowes with a value of \$274.50.
- Karl Farwig reviewed the year-end Treasurer's documents and noted that there were some errors in the listed budgeted amounts on the Actual vs Budgeted – 2022 year-end document; A copy of the hand-corrected document is attached to these minutes
- A motion to approve the corrected Treasurer's Report was made by Pete Reynolds and seconded by Peggy Biolchini. The motion passed.

#### Coordinator's Report: Ed Lentz

- We currently have 36 active members and all have been recertified for 2023.
- Nicole Hoffman is assigned to the A&R section at the OSU Extension office which includes the

#### • Education Committee – Peggy Biolchini

- Ask-A-Master-Gardener There are currently only 8 people signed up to answer questions. She would like to see at least 15. Ed Lentz noted that everyone received 50 hours of training to become a Master Gardener, so all are well trained enough to answer these questions. ## Plan your garden for spring

January is a month for gardeners to dream and plan. With the rush of the holiday season behind us, take advantage of this quiet winter month to get ready for spring.

Here are some tasks you may want to tackle:

- · Put out bird feeders and keep them filled. If you place a feeder close to a window, you can enjoy watching and identifying the different birds that pay you a visit. Attracting feathered friends to your landscape has an added benefit in the spring when the birds can help control insect pests.
- · While you are outside filling the feeder, examine your shade and fruit trees. When you get a nice day in late winter, you can prune the trees while they are still dormant. Make sure you get rid of any diseased or damaged branches.
- · Also, take a critical look at your garden's structure. The bare-bones view of your landscape in January can help you identify what's missing. Do you need to add more evergreens, or large or small trees or shrubs? Do you need more structural elements, like garden paths, a shed or a gazebo? Do you need an evergreen screen or fence along a property line for increased privacy or to block out an unsightly view like a compost pile? Do you have a sunny spot where you can tuck in a small, raised bed vegetable garden? Or perhaps you want to carve out a space to entertain and relax in the shade? Go inside and sketch out your ideas on paper.
- · Plan your vegetable garden what are you going to grow this year and how many plants/seeds will you need? Write out a list of changes that you want to make in the garden this year. Brainstorm a list of plants that you would love to try in your garden.
- · For inspiration, browse through magazines and read gardening books. Specialty gardening magazines will be hitting the store shelves soon. These magazines are packed with beautiful pictures and articles about real gardens. If a plant combination or design idea catches your interest, flag it and try to mimic it in your garden. Also, make note of the articles that showcase new varieties of flowers and vegetables that you may want to try this year. Visit the Findlay-Hancock County Public Library for a nice selection of gardening books on a variety of topics, from landscape design to basic gardening how-to.
- · Spend quality time reviewing the new seed and plant catalogs. They should be clogging your mail-box soon if they haven't already. If you are new to gardening, you can check out the websites of many seed and plant companies. Make a list of the seeds/plants you want to try and place your order early because popular new varieties sell out fast.
- · Make an inventory of your gardening tools and supplies. If you didn't clean your gloves or tools in the fall, bring them inside and do it now. You can soak gardening tools (like hand spades and hand pruners) in a mixture of water and bleach to sanitize. Some gardeners paint the handles of their tools bright orange in the winter so they are easier to find in the garden come spring. Make a list of the tools that you need to replace and start shopping.

## It's Time To...

### **FEBRUARY 4**

- •Start houseplants from seed for a challenge.
- •Grow vegetables among your flowers.
- •Grow fresh parsley and other herbs in containers in a sunny window.
- •Look for disease-resistant varieties when ordering seeds.
- Wash and sterilize seed-starting containers.
- •Read garden magazines and books for new ideas for your garden.
- •Visit an arboretum to see plants with winter interest.
- •Plan to grow extra vegetables in 2023 to share with the needy.
- Provide fresh water for wildlife.

#### **FEBRUARY 11**

- •Force paper white narcissus bulbs.
- •Look though seed and nursery catalogues for gardening ideas.
- •Draw your vegetable garden plan on paper.
- •Clean and sharpen garden tools.
- ·Share seed orders with a friend and save money.
- •Use sterilized soil or soilless mix when starting seeds indoors.
- Avoid walking on the lawn during thaws.
- •Provide food and water for wildlife.

## **FEBRUARY 18**

- •Give your Valentine a plant or a gift certificate for garden supplies.
- •Consider planting some fruit this year.
- •Know your USDA plant hardiness zone before ordering plants.
- Cottonseed meal can lower soil pH.
- •Cool temperatures extend the life of cut flowers.
- •Start tuberous begonias for June bloom.
- •Use dwarf plants where space is limited.

## **FEBRUARY 25**

- •Repot rootbound houseplants.
- •Get pruning tools sharpened and ready for use.
- •Review your gardening plans for 2023
- •Replant frost-heaved plants.
- •It is too early to apply dormant oil.
- •Make plant labels from plastic bleach and milk bottles.
- •Give unwanted garden catalogs to teachers and childcare workers.
- Start garden plants from seed indoors.
- Provide food and water for wildlife.
- •Purchase vegetable seeds from your favorite suppliers.
- Purchase nursery stock for planting next month.
